Welcome to the world of the QR Code.

You can locate one at almost every turn; whether you see one on a storefront window, in a magazine advertisement or, well, pretty much anywhere. The “Quick Response Code” is the new fast way to find what you are looking for. Although the QR code was originally designed for industrial uses, it’s quickly become common in consumer advertising and now in Oklahoma classrooms.

Through Oklahoma Educational Technology Trust (OETT) award grants, kids of all ages are utilizing this feature with use of their iPad QR-code scanner, which enables them to be directed immediately to the associated website to gather information.

The mission of OETT is to equip Oklahoma common school & CareerTech students with the technology and technological skills necessary to compete in the global marketplace. The Trust provides funds for computer and telecommunications equipment, infrastructure, leadership and professional development to implement and advance integration of technology into classroom instruction.

OETT was created in 2001 from the leadership of former Oklahoma Attorney General Drew Edmondson and the initial funding of \$30 million from AT&T Oklahoma.

PHASE 1 - LEADERSHIP TRAINING

To help administrators and teachers better understand what is necessary for school and students success, OETT contracts with the K20 Center for Educational and Community Renewal at the University of Oklahoma. Participants learn about IDEALS for Student Achievement and how they relate to technology use in the classroom.

PHASE 2 - GRANTING PROCESS



Schools & districts whose superintendents and/or administrators have completed Phase I are eligible to apply for OETT grants. Phase II grants provide new technology equipment, staff release time, and professional development. Schools are selected through a blind evaluation process by grant review teams representing the fields of education, technology, and community leadership.

SUSTAINING PHASE 2 GRANTS

Sustaining Phase II grants provide additional funding for equipment upgrades, repair/replacement, and ongoing professional development needs to a limited number of past OETT grant schools.

MANGUM HIGH SCHOOL students now participate in many interdisciplinary learning projects. An old tree by their school (called the “Kissing Tree” which is the background picture) was cut down following storm damage. Cross section rings were studied to connect rainfall totals in Science & Math classrooms while History & English classes researched and documented what was happening in various ring eras. A large cutting was varnished, signed by students, and is now a permanent table in the library.

Students across the state are making iMovies. At PUTNAM CITY CENTRAL ELEMENTARY they add musical back groups and record progress on projects like hatching chicks. At YARBROUGH SCHOOLS student produced movies were showcased at the Guymon movie theatre’s “Film Festival.”

OETT'S mission to integrate technology & leadership in order to change the "learning landscape" began in 2001 with grants to convene superintendents and administrators in a dialogue about the best practices of high achieving schools (see page 4). In 2003, OETT began making technology grants to Oklahoma schools and year-long professional development into their classrooms.

Gloria Hamlin, our Evaluation Associate, studied the changes that have occurred during this first decade of grantmaking and presented a 10th Year Anniversary Report to the OETT board last year, and her key findings are remarkable!

- THE HIGHEST PERCENTAGE OF OETT GRANTS WENT TO RURAL SCHOOLS, AND THE PERCENTAGES OF GRANT SCHOOL TYPES (ELEMENTARY, MIDDLE/JUNIOR HIGH, HIGH SCHOOL) MIRROR THE PERCENTAGES OF THOSE SCHOOLS ACROSS THE STATE.
- 72% OF THE DISTRICTS RECEIVING GRANTS NOW HAVE A FULL TIME TECHNOLOGY DIRECTOR (THE STATE'S AVERAGE WAS 52%)
- 71% OF THE DISTRICTS HAVE LOCAL EDUCATION FOUNDATIONS
- THERE HAVE BEEN NOTICEABLE TRENDS IN EQUIPMENT PURCHASED WITH OETT GRANT FUNDS. BEGINNING GRANT SCHOOLS SOUGHT DESKTOP AND LAPTOP COMPUTERS FOR LAB USE. FROM 2007-2009 GRANT SCHOOLS FOCUSED ON PUTTING INTERACTIVE WHITEBOARDS & PROJECTORS IN AS MANY CLASSROOMS AS POSSIBLE. IN RECENT YEARS 1:1 INITIATIVES HAVE BEEN A PRIORITY AS SCHOOLS ATTEMPT TO PURCHASE MULTIMEDIA DEVICES (IPAD, ITOUCH, NETBOOKS, ETC.) IN THE HANDS OF EVERY STUDENT. IN MANY OF THOSE SCHOOLS THE STUDENTS ACTUALLY KEEP THE DEVICE FOR THE SCHOOL YEAR, USING IT AT SCHOOL AND HOME.
- TEACHERS' USE OF TECHNOLOGY HAS GROWN SIGNIFICANTLY IN ALL FIVE AREAS OF USE: COMMUNICATION, STUDENT ASSESSMENT, CLASSROOM ACTIVITIES, COLLABORATION, AND LESSON DESIGN.
- OETT GRANTS HAVE BEEN CATALYSTS FOR MANY SCHOOL DISTRICT BOND ISSUES WITH OETT GRANT SCHOOLS SERVING AS THE "PILOT" SCHOOL AND BECOMING A "MODEL" SCHOOL OF THEIR DISTRICT.

Since grantmaking began in 2002, there has been significant change in instruction, too. Classroom teachers are moving from what has been termed "traditional" instruction (lecture & worksheets) to more "authenticity" (learning activities that are genuine and connected with real life experiences) and finding that students are more engaged and attentive, resulting in higher achievement & better classroom behaviors, too.

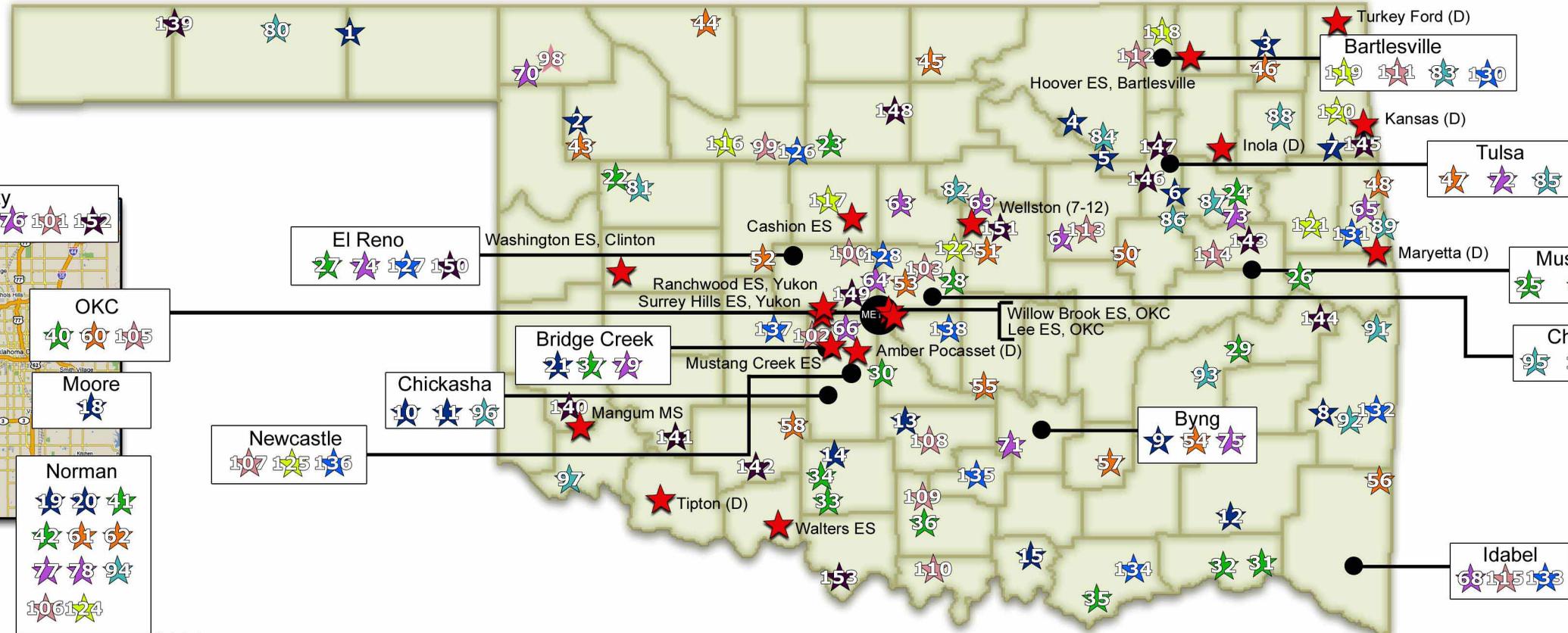
